One of the things that drew me to First Free was that it was old. I like old things: a leather chair with a rich patina, an old oak tree that almost reaches the heavens, a vintage motorcycle in a paint color that they just don't make anymore. And here was a church that was older than me, older than my parents, older than my grandparents, even older than my great (and perhaps great great) grandparents. This church's story stretches back to 1880, and as far as U.S. history goes, that's almost Jurassic. It's downright ancient. People have been meeting to encounter the living God in song, Scripture, sacrament, and Spirit in our building on the corner of Ashland and Berwyn for almost 100 years. Of course, our story is actually much more ancient than 1880, stretching all the way back to Jesus of Nazareth, and even to Abraham and Sarah, the father and mother of our faith.

I loved that First Free had history, but I also appreciated the equally important openness to contemporary culture and desire to follow where the Holy Spirit is leading today. First Free isn't a museum. Over the years our church's name has changed, our location has changed, and even the very language we use to talk about God has changed from Swedish to English. Over the century we have emphasized different aspects of the faith, holding a different side of the one Gospel diamond up to the light, and refracting a unique ray of truth, goodness and beauty to the surrounding neighborhood.

we're old... yet new.

In the words of Robert Webber, First Free lends itself to being an "ancient-future" church: a church that is rooted in the ancient path, but desiring to offer a fresh demonstration of the Gospel to our neighbors.

I spent much of my first year subtly seeking to lean us further into this direction. We spent the first four months together in our series *Honest* to *God: Learning to Pray the Psalms*, and there is no Christian prayer book more ancient than the book of Psalms, which contain the very words Jesus would have often recited in prayer. After this we jumped into the series *All Things New: Following Jesus as Perpetual Beginners*, where we examined and explored the ever refreshing trajectory of God towards the renewal of all things.

## A Hospitable Strangeness

Every Sunday we've sought to enact the story of God, reminding one another not only of God's continual presence among us, but that we actually get to participate in the Trinitarian activity to redeem and restore the world! We've reinstated intentional moments of liturgy that are both ancient (incorporating prayers and practices of the oldest communities of the Christian faith) and modern (using technology and music and language that is decidedly 21st century). If someone randomly attended our church off the street, they'd be confronted with a hospitable strangeness. Hospitable because of the love, kindness, and accessibility of our community and worship, and strange because we're often embracing ancient practices of the faith like confessing our sin, reciting liturgical prayers aloud, or sitting in silent prayer for five minutes!

## The Table & the Calendar

In worship we're learning to intentionally orient our shared lives around two things: the table and the calendar. In participating in communion every week, we're remembering that the worship service is primarily about encountering Christ at the table, not hearing a good sermon. It is Christ who gathers us, Christ who forgives us, Christ who saves us, and Christ who sends us. Christ is at the center, not me. The table should visually, symbolically, and practically remind us of this all-too-easy-to-forget truth. We also are learning to orient our lives around the Christian calendar, also known as the liturgical year. We tell the story of Christ's birth and life through Advent and Epiphany, his passion, death and resurrection through Lent and Easter, and his sending of the Spirit's empowering presence in Pentecost. All of our present day time becomes caught up in the most compelling ancient story ever told.

## Discernment & Sabbath

The elders have been learning and re-learning how to incorporate the ancient practices of discernment and sabbath in a way that makes sense for today. By leaning into the ancient way of discernment we trust we can more faithfully notice and nurture the innovative movement of the Holy Spirit amongst us. By first practicing sabbath amongst ourselves, we hope to lead the whole church forward in God's gift of rest and sustainable life rhythms.

So together let's continue to journey back to the sometimes awkward and sometimes awe-inspiring ancient practices of the faith so that we can hear the present voice of God more clearly, imagine a creative way forward more faithfully, and respond in love for the sake of our neighbors more obediently.



## Serving Our Community

## **Organizations & Activities**

First Free takes a partnership approach to serving our community. That means we assist or serve within organizations that are already very good at helping. Below are some of the organizations we work with and the ways we serve.

#### Schneider Senior Building

This is a local Chicago Housing Authority building with apartments for seniors 62 and older.

- Developing relationships with individual residents and assisting with spiritual, relational and social needs.
- Providing food and assisting with the building's Christmas party and other building events

#### **Passages Charter School**

Passages is a local school, the majority of whose students are first or secondgeneration immigrants from many countries.

- Hosting 8th grade graduation in the church sanctuary
- · Working in the after school program
- A meeting with the principal is scheduled in June to discuss ways First Free might be able to serve this school in the 23-24 school year.

#### **World Relief**

Our largest outreach effort this year was the care of a family of six seeking asylum in the United States in partnership with World Relief. We housed the family in one of First Free's available apartments and our Care team tirelessly provided for the material, spiritual, and financial needs of this family, including:

- Immediate care needs--providing, protecting, listening and connecting to the best of our ability.
- Transportation to doctors visits, school visits, emergency room trips, summer camp celebrations, trips to the beach, and other events.
- Expenses for the children's attendance at local park district summer camps.
- Food, clothing, and housewares as needed
- Providing ESL lessons to the parents
- Games and play for the kids in the space behind the church and in their home.
- Eventually helping them move and transition to new, more permanent housing.



Our ministry of Crisis & Compassion (C&C) seeks to meet the physical needs of those in the church body as well as prayer for and outreach to members of our congregation going through difficult times.

Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.





We have a facilties team comprised of staff and volunteers that care deeply about First Free and strive to act in a Christ-minded manner to keep all the buildings and grounds of First Free in clean, good working condition to meet the needs of the church, its ministries, tenants and space sharing partners.


### **Significant Repairs this Year**

- Caulking and repair of limestone capstone on top of the family life center
- Roof repair above the gym
- Replacement of pumps for the boiler system
- Repair of sanctuary ceiling plaster (ongoing with addition of crown molding)
- Replacement of all Fellowship Hall lights with LED tubes

### **Regular Maintenance Activities**

- · Periodically stripping and waxing floors
- · Weekly cleaning of all facility spaces
- Maintaining proper door lock schedules
- Preparation of apartments for new tenants
- Periodic maintenance of staff and tenant apartment buildings (e.g. sourcing a new refrigerator, sourcing a new water heater, replacing locks duplicating keys)
- Regular maintenance and testing of HVAC systems




### **Members and their Families**

## Elder Chair Report

Let me start out by stating how thankful I am to be working alongside Matt and the rest of the elder team. It has been a privilege to serve with them. A shout out to elder Rachel Einfeldt who stepped away from the board this year but whose wisdom is still felt and utilized as we move forward.

This first year of Matt's ministry was a chance for him to get to know the church and community, while also building into staff and redeveloping the Sunday worship services. The plan was to provide Matt with 6 months to better understand FF and its people before we began future planning in earnest.

## **Spiritual Direction Retreat**

The elders, along with a few key leaders and staff members attended a 2 ½ day training in spiritual discernment. The Ruth Haley Barton-lead retreat included teaching and spiritual discernment sessions. These were the main take-aways we felt God directing us to:

- 1. We will not excessively focus on the church's construction loan debt in the next 18 months or conduct a fund-raising campaign, but instead will focus on the spiritual formation of our leaders and congregants. If as a church we are becoming spiritually healthier, then God will work out issues of finances and growth. Interestingly enough, with only a brief mention of the loan debt on a few occasions, we have seen a few significant gifts given to this fund over the past year. God indeed will provide!
- 2. While we will get involved in outreach opportunities in our community once again, the focus on healthy spiritual development as leaders and congregants will remain a primary focus. We recognize that there are volunteers at FF that serve in multiple ministries, and we sense a level of exhaustion and burnout. We would like to explore ways to make serving sustainable and life-giving as we look towards how God is growing our church.

## **Other Activities & Changes**

#### **Tov Study**

We finished up a study on "A Church Called Tov: Forming a Goodness Culture That Resists Abuses of Power and Promotes Healing.

#### Sabbath Study

We have just finished A video and discussion series on practicing the Sabbath. Pastor Matt has challenged the elders to make sabbath a part of their week and we will in-turn be challenging the congregation to do the same.

#### Regular Q&As

An expanded number of after-church Question and Answer sessions are now offered to discuss issues in depth without extending Ministry Community Meetings. These Q&As will address big picture issues such as annual budgets and new ministry initiatives

#### **Elder Newsletter**

We have reinstituted elder email updates to the congregation to inform members of what the elders are working on between quarterly Ministry Community Meetings.

#### **Shorter MCMs**

The feedback we have been receiving from many is to keep the MCM's shorter and to focus these gatherings on how God is working among us. As in recent MCM's, we will have time to discuss issues in small groups over lunch and will include stories and reports of how God is working.

#### **Elder Prayer**

The elders have reinstituted after church elder prayer sessions where those with burdens and concerns can be lifted up by the elders.

#### **Staffing Changes**

Rebekah was hired in October to lead our children's ministries and we are so grateful to have her. In addition, Maggie will begin in a full-time role this summer, splitting time between youth and worship. Growing healthy disciples will be a primary focus at First Free. As such, while it is much easier to use lay folks to lead adult discipleship programs, we have found it harder to find lay leaders/deacons who have the time available to lead our children and youth discipleship programs (hence the great need for staffing in these areas).

## On Staying & Going

During Easter week I read through the final chapters of all four gospels. Jesus final words in each gospel are well known to most of you:

> "Go and make disciples of all nations..... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded" (Matthew 28:19) "go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation" (Mark 16:15)

"stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49) "feed my sheep.....follow me"

(Christ's words to Peter in John 21:17,19)

Note that there is a vital place and reason for 'staying' before going out (for the apostles in Luke account, it was for the receiving of the Holy Spirit, followed by the building of a community via teaching, fellowship, breaking of bread and prayer). I don't know about you, but I'm more a 'go' type of person than a 'stay' type of person. Yet these last 6 years have, by necessity, involved a lot of 'staying'. I am thankful that First Free is now in a relatively stable place after a number of years of pastoral changes and COVID lockdowns. While it has been frustrating to have limits on our discipleship and ministry efforts; at the same time, I sense that God has used--and will use--these past years to grow us closer as a body, to help us understand the purposes he has for us, and to be ready to make the changes needed when called to do so.

Part of what we are discerning as elders is what our specific focus should be in upcoming years. What local outreach or people groups is God calling us to serve in Andersonville? How can we equip our congregants to be a kingdom witness to their neighbors where they live? how do we limit/streamline the amount of activity that goes on at First Free in order that people have the time to do ongoing kingdom work in the community? What does effective adult discipleship and practicing of the sabbath look like at church? What kind of model do we incorporate into our church to facilitate incarnational, missional, small groups to reach those who will not step foot in our church?

I am looking forward to seeing where God leads us.
